The proposed Ordinance 2024-05 amends the City Code to adopt the 2024 International Property Maintenance Code, as modified therein, which adopts property maintenance standards for all property located in the City of Winter Springs, including residential, commercial, and industrial land. The City previously adopted the 2006 International Property Maintenance Code.

(a) Estimate of direct compliance costs that businesses may reasonably incur if the proposed ordinance is enacted:

The ordinance updates the property maintenance standards in Winter Springs from the previously-adopted 2006 International Property Maintenance Code (IPMC) to the 2024 International Property Maintenance Code, recommended by the International Code Council to best protect the public health, safety and welfare. The International Property Maintenance Code addresses topics such as maintenance of exterior surfaces (e.g., roofs, walls, soffits, windows); swimming pools; weed growth; and sidewalks in a clean, safe, and sanitary condition and in a proper state of repair. Only businesses maintaining their property as nuisances will be directly affected by potential code enforcement liens or nuisance abatement liens, as determined by the City's Code Enforcement Board or a court of law. If a property maintenance violation exists, direct compliance costs will vary depending on the scope of the nuisance and the repair and restoration work necessary to correct the violation to restore the property into a clean, safe, and sanitary condition as required by the IPMC. Therefore, direct compliance costs cannot be generally determined at this time. However, overall, businesses in Winter Springs will benefit from enforcement of uniform property maintenance standards that will protect the public health, safety, welfare, and aesthetics of the surrounding community.
